

I. for marrying the king s eldest daughter (130/3), and again in 30 Edw. III. for knighting the king s eldest son (130/16). The money equivalent, reckoned at forty shillings upon every knight s fee, was very nearly the same, namely; 59 los. 6d. in the former case, and 59 los. 4d. in the latter. Aid Under the feudal system three principal aids were due, as of right, to the king from all persons who held of him in capite, namely: --1. To ransom his person, when taken prisoner in war; 2. To make his eldest son a knight; 3. To marry his eldest daughter. These are enumerated and particularly excepted in Art. 12 (p. 3) of John s Great Charter, by which it was provided: -- No scutage or aid shall be laid in our kingdom, except by the general council...
