In towns, then, and especially in old towns and largo cities, all well water must be viewed with the greatest suspicion, and should never be used for drinking purposes unless examined occasionally by a good analyst. In towns the subsoil is very impure, old cesspits often abound, and the soakage from these percolates into the wells. In the country, too, how often we find within a, few yards of the pump an old brick drain, a privy, or a dunghill? To show to how great an extent sewage will soak from bad drains or cesspools into the sod, Dr. Parkes states that in some loose soils cesspits used for fifty years have never been emptied, and still are not full, owing to soakage. Professor Pettenkofer estimates that, at Munich, 90 per cent. of the excretions pass...
