

The committee reported: The proportion of physically unfit increases with the length of the hours of work. A later investigation was made covering the relation of output to hours of work. Various groups of workers were watched over a period of 27 weeks, during which time their hours of work were lowered. In the case of 100 women who were turning fuse bodies, which is fairly heavy work, a reduction in the average hours worked per week of from 68. 2 to 59. 7 was followed by a 23 per cent increase in hourly rate and an 8 per cent increase of weekly output.
